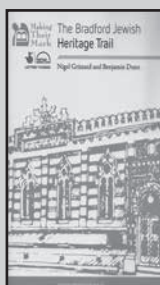
THIS 36-page full-colour booklet is the latest product produced by authors Nigel Grizzard and Benjamin Dunn and supports Nigel's long-standing efforts in putting Bradford on the Jewish tourist map with his walking tour of the city.

He started running his tours in 1983 and has succeeded in whetting the appetites of Bradfordians and visitors alike ever since.

The Jewish Heritage Trail received a boost in 2007 with the 350th anniversary of the readmission of Jews into England and in 2011 they received a Heritage Grant from the National Lottery to help "preserve this diverse and fascinating heritage".

The book has one page per topic, be it "Little Germany", the various Jewish communities, monuments, doctors, each illustrated with an appropriate picture. There are also pages that highlight individuals who made their mark in business, civic life, the arts and sport and later pages describe the actual tour in some detail together with a Jewish timeline.
